Reference is made to a report dated July 23, 1952 addressed to the Embassy from Mr. Maurice W. Altaffer, American Consul General, Palermo, concerning the suggested use of "confine" for international criminals.

I concur with Mr. Altaffer that police restriction of international hoodlums such as Salvatore Lucania, alias "Lucky" Luciano to the towns or villages of their birth would facilitate effective police surveillance. To take away from a criminal engaged in the international traffic of illicit drugs, the freedom of movement, is to seriously hamper his activity.

It is a matter of Italian police record that upon instruction from the Minister of Interior, through General D'Antoni, Chief of Police, Dr. Giuseppe Doai has ordered local Questuras to restrict criminals deported from the United States to Italy to their cities of birth. Two such incidents are Salvatore Mangano of Trapani, Sicily and Giovanni Di Pietro *of Naples*

With respect to the latter, only several weeks ago I was advised that his Italian Passport had been revoked and that he was ordered to leave ~~Italy~~ and remain in Catania, Sicily. This action was predicated on information which I submitted to Dr. Doai, that Di Pietro intended to leave Italy for a Central American country in furtherance of an alleged illicit narcotic transaction. Although I did not request it, Di Pietro was ordered to leave Naples and return to Catania.

At the time that I communicated this information to Dr. Doai, I have also submitted several letters concerning various reliable and independent sources who claimed that Luciano intended to use his Italian passport to travel to
